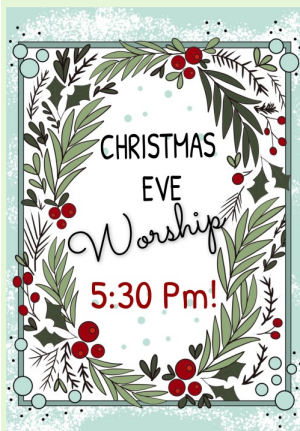

"Nazareth, did you know?"

This Advent, I wonder about the community Mary and Joseph knew and were nurtured in before the birth of Jesus. The dynamics of the Nazareth community and Synagogue?

How that community rejoiced with Joseph and Mary when they announced that they would join their lives together as one.

I wonder how things changed when it was discovered that Mary was with child? If Mary and Joseph prayed for those who turned away from them?

Was the length of time Mary spent with her aunt Elizabeth, in the hill country, enough for them to accept Mary as she was, still a person deserving of respect and dignity, despite (or especially because) she was with child outside of the covenant of marriage. Did the broader community notice Mary and Joseph's faith in God's provision sustaining their hope and joy despite the improper circumstances?

And then the mandatory census disrupted everyone's lives. If you were living in the town of your family's heritage. I imagine, one would need to make room in your home to accommodate uncles' families and cousins who would have to come 'home' to be counted in the census.

It is a familiar detail of Joseph and Mary's story that Joseph was required by the "decree from Emperor Augustus that all the world should be registered", to travel to "Bethlehem, because he was descended from the house and family of David."

The narrative suggests that that village was overwhelmed, no relative to stay with and no room in the inn. Yet they were offered the comfort of a stable, in consideration of Mary's being with child and near delivery.

This Advent, I wonder about the community Mary and Joseph knew and were nurtured in before the birth of Jesus, and returned to with toddler Jesus after their exodus from Egypt, inspired in part by an article titled "The Urgent Need For Small Churches."

Thom S. Rainer, author of "Autopsy of a Deceased Church" focuses in this article on the significant contributions small churches have made to life in small towns, and that the need is as great as ever for relational connection found in small congregations.

"This is not a nostalgic problem – it's a missional crisis. . . these are

precisely the places where the Gospel can transform lives through personal connection and presence.”

“In a culture that often feels impersonal and transactional, smaller congregations provide what sociologists call ‘high-tough’ community. People know one another by name. They notice when someone is missing. They share meals, burdens, and celebrations together.”

“Jesus built His church on relationships, not programs. In smaller churches, evangelism is personal, discipleship is intentional, and pastoral care happens naturally through proximity. The intimacy of small-church life mirrors the early church more closely than many other models.”

It is easy for me to imagine Mary and Joseph’s faith was nurtured in such a place, and they had understood grace for the politics without losing sight of the promises and real support God provides and fosters through community gathered around, and for, the real presence of God. May we continue to kindle the warmth of our faith life and invite those outside to share in the hope and joy, peace and love, we receive through mutual relationship with God.

The Angels' Song in Three Words

On the very first Christmas Eve, frightened shepherds were suddenly surrounded by light and music. A choir of angels filled the night sky, singing: "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men" (Luke 2:14, KJV).

Nineteenth-century pastor Charles Kingsley reflected on how those three simple words — glory, peace, and good will — still capture the meaning of Jesus' birth and the hope it brings.

Glory.

God's glory isn't shown in dazzling displays of power but in humility and mercy. The baby in the manger revealed God's greatness by stooping low, forgiving, and showing love.

Peace.

True peace is more than the absence of conflict. It comes when we follow God's example of selflessness, giving up pride and selfish ambition to live in harmony with one another.

Good will.

God's good will toward us is a gift that transforms our lives. Through Jesus, God invites us out of selfishness and sin into a life marked by love, kindness, and community.

The angels' song wasn't meant only for shepherds long ago. It still sings to us today, calling each of us to live in glory, peace, and good will.

POINSETTIA — This shrub, native to Mexico, is at
the heart of legend about a poor girl who wanted
to bring Baby Jesus a gift one Christmas Eve. As
she walked to church, she gathered a bouquet of
weeds — which Jesus miraculously transformed
into lovely red flowers. Thus the poinsettia
(named for Joel Poinsett, the U.S. ambassador to
Mexico who first brought the plant to America)
is known in Mexico as la flor de la Nochebuena
(flower of the Holy Night). The poinsettia is
also an ideal Christmas
symbol because its leaves
turn red when deprived of
sunlight and its flowers
(the red
inner buds) bloom in
December.

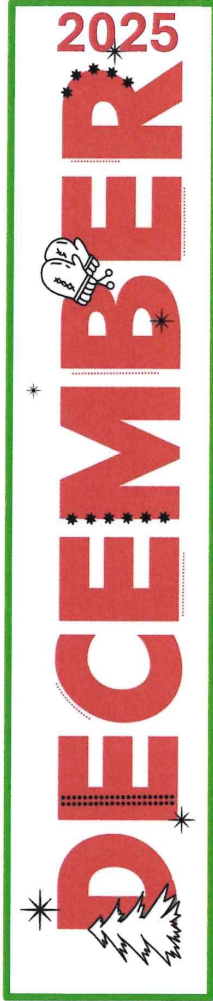
